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Volusia Homes are Taking Longer to Sell

Dos and Don'ts of Selling Quickly

VOLUSIA COUNTY: Over the past couple of years, it seemed like every home in Volusia County was selling within a few days of hitting the market. According to the New Smyrna Beach Board of Realtors' monthly market detail for January and February 2023, the number of days from listing to contract has extraordinarily increased when compared to last year. When considering the local market report's median and average days to contract, it is important to keep in mind that some homes sell more quickly than others.

Sellers want as much money as they can get and most prefer "the quicker, the better."

What defines quick in real estate? There is no absolute definition and it depends on a few factors. The market conditions, price range of a home and choices made by the seller can all impact how quickly a home sells.

The amount of time it takes for houses to sell is moderately cyclical and driven by the market. Neither of which can be controlled by a Realtor® or a seller. Below is a list of some things that can be controlled in order to sell a home quickly:

- Know the local average days on market. A Realtor can review the local recent sales data to determine how many days on market and the movement in the property's price bracket.
- Price the home appropriately. Overpricing will cost a seller more time. This is one of the most common mistakes made by a seller. A Realtor can research comparables and advise the best selling strategy.
- Make it easy for showing buyers. The more flexible the scheduling can be, the better. The seller should make a plan to be away from the home and provide the best times of day to the Realtor. Take into consideration the most convenient times for buyers.

Adjust the price if necessary. The first week or two of listing brings the most serious buyers. The "active buyers" are already shopping the market. Lack of activity, interest or an offer within this time frame is likely a sign for a price reduction. A Realtor can identify if patience at the price point is necessary or if it is an indication the price needs to be reduced.

Sellers may want to list sooner than later, before prices fall more. Buyers that used to have to race to beat the competition can now take their time touring homes. However, in coastal communities like New Smyrna Beach, Port Orange and Ormond Beach, still few homes are being listed. If a house is listed, that checks all the buyers' needs, buyers in the current market are prepared to negotiate hard. While value may fall in the near term, economists predict equity can be gained within the first five to ten years of owning the home.

News about taking longer to sell should be taken lightly. Research data shows that even during a "hot market," the number of days on market can vary greatly. If planning to sell soon, consider how long it is taking to sell in the property's neighborhood and at what price range.

There are many benefits to hiring a Realtor to list the property. Historically, properties listed with agents receive more at the bottom line than for sale by owner (FSBO) listings. A Realtor can hand over researched, current and reputable data regarding the neighborhood's comparables, demographics and location in order for a seller to make the best decision of how to proceed with pricing for the quickest sale.

SCHOLARSHIPS AVAILABLE FOR COUNTY SUMMER CAMPS

Volusia County Government's Community Assistance Division will start accepting 2023 summer camp scholarship applications at 7:30 a.m. Monday, April 10.

Scholarships are awarded to income-eligible households for children between the ages of five and 14. For a child to receive a scholarship, they must have completed kindergarten by the conclusion of the 2022 - 2023 school year. Additionally, children up to the age of 17 planning to attend an approved special needs camp are also eligible to apply for a scholarship. It is preferred for applicants to upload their completed application and supporting documentation through the secure portal at Volusia.org. The portal to upload applications will be available at 7:30 a.m. Monday, April 10.



Applications may also be mailed or provided in person to the Community Assistance Division, 121 W. Rich Avenue, DeLand, FL 32720. Faxed or incomplete applications will not be accepted.

NEW VSO ATLAS ONE APP AVAILABLE FOR VOLUSIA RESIDENTS & VISITORS

The Volusia Sheriff's Office is rolling out a new mobile app to further connect, inform and engage with the public: Atlas One, free for download on iOS and Android.



The new Atlas One app will replace SaferWatch, which is being phased out this week. SaferWatch users are asked to download Atlas One today and create an account to continue receiving information like Air One alerts. Atlas One offers a variety of resources in addition to real-time alerts based on a user's location. The app can also accept crime tips, photo/video evidence and other messages that can be routed to the appropriate deputy, detective, or other personnel.

While the app has a host of features to help enhance public safety, the Sheriff's Office is still encouraging users to call 911 in an emergency. Even with the availability of an app, 911 is the preferred contact method for anyone in need of law enforcement, fire or emergency medical response in Volusia County.

VSO is the first Sheriff's Office in Florida to offer Atlas One to its residents. The Fort Myers Police Department became the first public safety agency in Florida to deploy it in June 2022.

During the initial launch of Atlas One, VSO will primarily use the app to send alerts when the Air One helicopter is overhead in a user's general area. The app also connects users to VSO's social media and website, where information on in-progress calls is frequently posted.

Atlas One is just the latest tool VSO is deploying to push information to the public. The agency also uses Everbridge to send emergency alerts and reverse 911s to residents based on geographic location.

How Atlas One Works:

- Download the free iOS or Android Atlas One App
- Tap "GET STARTED" to create your Atlas One profile
- Share your location or add favorite places that you want to track
- If an alert occurs nearby your current location, the app will send a push notification alert
- If you have a crime tip or evidence, easily share text, photos, and videos with VSO

MARINE SCIENCE CENTER REOPENS BIRD HOSPITAL

With a better understanding of the avian flu and protocols to increase the safety of native birds and staff, the Marine Science Center has reopened its bird hospital and resumed admission of sick and injured birds.

Staff is available from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. seven days a week to accept bird patients at the bird hospital, 4965 S. Peninsula Drive, Ponce Inlet.

"The Marine Science Center Bird Hospital is a crucial resource for the community and its native wild birds," said Bird Hospital Manager Tracy Dawson. "With the reopening, we are once again able to provide expert care for sick and injured wild birds." All new birds will be screened for symptoms of the avian flu before entering the bird hospital and will undergo a quarantine period before being released into the flight enclosure. This measure will help prevent the spread of disease and ensure that the birds are healthy and fit for release.

The bird hospital had been closed since February 2022. During the closure, staff completed several construction projects, providing the bird hospital with easy-to-disinfect surfaces, including nonporous flooring and scrubbable ceiling tiles. Staff has undergone in-depth training on biosecurity protocols, including the use of personal protective equipment, to reduce the risk of disease outbreaks.

According to the Centers for Disease Control's website: "Since 2022, despite the wide geographic spread of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) A(H5N1) viruses in wild birds and to poultry worldwide, with sporadic spillover to mammals, only a small number of sporadic human cases of A(H5N1) have been identified. All reported human cases since 2022 were associated with recent poultry exposures, and no cases of human-tohuman transmission have been identified.




To date, HPAI A(H5N1) viruses currently circulating in birds and poultry, with spillover to mammals, and those that have caused human infections do not have the ability to easily bind to receptors that predominate in the human upper respiratory tract. Therefore, the current risk to the public from HPAI A(H5N1) viruses remains low. However, because of the potential for influenza viruses to rapidly evolve and the wide global prevalence of HPAI A(H5N1) viruses in wild birds and poultry outbreaks, continued sporadic human infections are anticipated."

Pictured above is Bubba, a great horned owl who broke a wing and is a permanent resident of the bird hospital.

The Marine Science Center provides treatment and rehabilitation for an average of 1,100 sick and injured birds each year and provides a permanent residence for birds that cannot be released. For more information, the call the Marine Science Center at 386-304-5530 or visit:

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




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Denim Reinvented

TOMAZIN FARMS

I recently had the pleasure of visiting Tomazin Farms, located at 3779 Honeydew Lane, New Smyrna Beach, FL 32168. This family-owned and operated farm is run by the Tomazin family, including Bill Tomazin, his son Paul Tomazin and Missy Tomazin. As soon as I arrived, I could tell that this was a special place, steeped in history and committed to sustainable, harmonious farming practices.



The Tomazin family has been farming in the area since 1915, when they began growing vegetables and supplying them to the surrounding communities via horse. In 1936, Joseph Tomazin Jr. and Georgia (Luznar) Tomazin were married, established a homestead, and began farming at the current farm location. They began commercial farming in 1949.

In 2012, with his father Bill, the Barefoot Farmer, Paul joined his dad and began farming... barefoot as well. They expanded their distribution to include local restaurants and incorporating harmonious farming, which focuses on sustainable and regenerative farming practices that prioritize the health of the land, animals and people.

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I had the chance to join Paul and Missy on the farm for a day of harvesting their crops, barefoot of course. We ate beautifully colored daikon and watermelon radish right out of the ground and I discovered that mustard greens eaten raw have a completely different flavor than when they are cooked, an almost horseradish like quality that would really bring a fish tartar to life in my opinion.

I even got to drive the tractor, it was one of the highlights for me when I got to climb up and take control of the tractor through a row or two of crops with their trusted field-hand, Sadi, alongside.



I drove the tractor back to the barn to help wash the produce we just harvested. Paul and I proceeded to plunge our heads into an ice cold trough for a quick wake-up.

They host a farmers market open to the public every Saturday from 7:30 to 11:30 a.m. Local vendors set up and offer their goods, including elderberry jam, honey, fresh produce and even pastries. I devoured French toast and apple butter that didn't even need syrup from It's All Or Muffin and rocked out some tunes with the honey lady, Sarah. It was a great way to spend a Saturday.

After my delightful experience at Tomazin Farms, I was eager to continue my local farm tour and see what other treasures I could find. That's how I ended up at Fletcher Family Farm, a small family farm that boasts the freshest and cleanest hydroponic produce using sustainable farming practices.

Upon arrival, I was greeted by a couple members of the Fletcher Family, Marty, Sara and their 9-year-old daughter, Nelly (*pictured above*). I got a private tour of the farm and picked blueberries and ate them straight off the bush. Best. Blueberries. Ever.



The Fletchers live on the farm with their adorable animals including Eddie Murphy, the donkey, and Big Booty Judy, a pig who definitely lives up to her name.

The farm offers an array of produce and meat options, including beef, pork, fresh eggs from free-range chickens, and even farm-fresh honey from their newly added bees.

They offer pastureraised beef and pork with no added hormones, steroids, or antibiotics. Their animals' diets consist of a healthy balance of vegetables, grass, hay and grains. And, boy, would I like to get my hands on some of that.

They offer subscriptions to their fresh, local and seasonal produce delivered straight to your door. Marty said it best, "There is no gap in our production, you can enjoy our produce all year because we control the environment where it grows."



Fletcher Family Farm grows lettuce and herbs indoors hydroponically and tomatoes, peppers and okra outdoors in hydroponic Dutch buckets. They supply fresh produce to local restaurants like The Spott in New Smyrna Beach and Millie's in Daytona Beach. You can find them at The Pavilion at Port Orange Farmers Market every Saturday from 9 a.m. - 1 p.m. and at the Windermere Farmers Market every Friday from 9 a.m. - 1 p.m.



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Exploring Gold Head Branch State Park

Spring is in full swing and our family's favorite place to be is the great outdoors. With 175 official state parks throughout Florida, there's plenty to choose from to commune with nature. This past month, we chose one of the OGs - Mike Roess Gold Head Branch State Park.

In response to the Great Depression, President Franklin D. Roosevelt established the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) in 1933 as part of the New Deal programs. Designed as a way to combat unemployment and create much needed jobs for Americans, while also sheltering precious environmental areas, the CCC began creating state and national parks throughout the country. In 1935, hundreds of CCC youth and skilled craftsmen began work on Mike Roess Gold Head Branch State Park.

Located in Keystone Heights, about 30 minutes northeast of Gainesville, the park is named after the man who graciously donated the land for preservation. As one of the first eight state parks in Florida, the CCC cleared roads and campsites and gave access to a slice of natural Florida to visitors seeking the outdoors.

Throughout the New Deal era, the CCC would go on to construct buildings and trails throughout 800 parks nationwide and plant more than three billion trees. Nearly 90 years later, the roughly 2400-acre Gold Head Branch State Park is still home to stunning landscapes and many of the original CCCbuilt structures including the picnic pavilion and several cabins available for rental.

Like many state parks, this one is also pet-friendly. We decided to bring along our newest rescue, BamBam, for his first big family adventure and a day of hiking and exploration. If you plan to bring a leashed pet, do plan ahead with plenty of water for your best bud and keep in mind that not all areas (including cabin areas) are permitted for furry ones. However, pets are allowed to join you at your campsite.

With Avery in tow, the two of them delighted in roaming the trails. BamBam, a goofy, muttly mix of some sort of terrier

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mixed with a lab (maybe?), lives up to his name and BAMS his way through life. He took great joy in clumsily splashing through the cool creek, known as the Gold Head Branch, that runs through the center of the park from Little Lake Johnson. Together they spied tiny fish in the stream and hunted down rocks for her ever-growing collection.



The park offers access via several trails to a variety of Florida landscapes. You have your pick of difficulty and length ranging from a quick 0.2-mile jaunt on a wooden

Her work focuses on travel and documentary photography. boardwalk to the more strenuous Ridge Trail that runs the length of the park. Many trails also cross or run along the famed Florida Trail, which runs 1,500 miles, from Big Cypress National Preserve to Fort Pickens at Gulf Islands National Seashore, Pensacola Beach, and is one of 11 National Scenic Trails in the US. One end of the park is home to the Trail Ridge Province, where you can climb greater elevations, while the opposite end slopes down and sinkholes are common.

We took a sandy hike to the overlook of Deer Lake before heading back to the overlook of the ravine. The two areas are in drastic contrast, with the ravine sloping down into more of a rainforest-esque scenery. Just around the corner, the Ravine Stairway allows you to make your way down into the landscape and view from a new perspective.

If hiking isn't your thing, both of these areas are accessible by car with parking close by. Do keep in mind, however, that the second option involves plenty of steps, which may not be suitable for everyone.

Further into the park, near a trio of lakes, are 73 camping sites, plenty of picnic areas, swimming areas, cabins and a playground. Canoes and kayaks are available for rental

or you can launch your own. This area also offers plenty of freshwater fishing spots.

Nearby is the Loblolly Loop, a one-mile loop trail through the woods that was a ton of fun to hike. It crosses over the Gold Head Branch several times and offers access to different points of the stream. After a heavy rain, parts of the trail may be underwater so dress accordingly. We had a great time working together to cross over the water, cracking up while BamBam gleefully divebombed the muddy water.

Together, our family kicked off our spring with a new adventure. At Mike Roess Gold Head Branch State Park, you'll be sure to find an adventure of your own to suit every member of your fam - even the four-legged ones!

TASTE Strawberry Moscato Sangria Preparation: Prep Time: 10 minutes · Chill Time: 1 hour · Servings: 4

Sweet, bubbly and aromatic, this fruity Spring Moscato Sangria is steeped in citrus, berries and kiwi, and is perfect for any springtime get-together!

Ingredients:

- Juice of 1 orange
- Juice of 1 lime
- 1/2 cup silver tequila
- 1/4 cup triple sec
- 2 cups pineapple juice
- 1 kiwi, peeled
- 4 strawberries, sliced
- Handful of raspberries
- 1 lime, sliced
- 1/2 orange, sliced
- 2 cups chilled Moscato di Asti



INSTRUCTIONS

Combine orange juice, lime juice, tequila and triple sec in a large pitcher. Stir, then add pineapple juice. Add all sliced fruit to juice and stir, muddling slightly. Refrigerate for at least 1 hour. When ready to serve, add chilled Moscato di Asti to the pitcher and stir. Place a few pieces of steeped fruit in each glass, then pour sangria on top. Add ice if desired, and enjoy!

Strawberry Panzanella Salad Preparation: Prep Time: 20 minutes · Cook Time: 10 minutes · Servings: 6

This Strawberry Panzanella Salad will be the breakout star of every meal this spring! Full of juicy tomatoes, sweet strawberries, toasted bread cubes, and topped with creamy burrata cheese, you won't be able to resist this classic Tuscan dish.

Ingredients:

- 1 pint grape or cherry tomatoes, halved
- 8 ounces strawberries, halved or quartered
- . 3-4 cups lettuce arugula or green/ red leaf
- 1/2 English cucumber, seeded and sliced
- 1 cup red onion, thinly sliced .
- 1/4 cup fresh basil leaves
- 3-4 slices thick cut bacon
- 12 ounces artisan bread ciabatta or sourdough, cut into 1-inch cubes
- Sea salt to taste
- 8 ounces burrata cheese

BALSAMIC VINAIGRETTE

- 1/2 cup olive oil
- 1/4 cup balsamic vinegar .
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- 1/4 teaspoon sea salt, plus more to taste
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper, plus more to taste



INSTRUCTIONS

In a large bowl, toss the tomatoes, strawberries, lettuce, cucumber, onion and basil with half of the dressing. Set aside to marinate.

In a large skillet set over medium heat, fry bacon until crispy. Set aside on a paper towel-lined plate, leaving the grease in the pan.

Add bread cubes to the pan with the bacon grease and return to the heat. Toast the bread, tossing occasionally, until evenly golden brown and crispy. Crumble or chop the bacon and gently toss it with the bread cubes.

Add the bread and bacon to the bowl with the salad mixture. Sprinkle with salt and pepper to taste, and allow everything to marinate unrefrigerated for 30 to 60 minutes. Transfer to a large serving plate or bowl and top with burrata cheese. Serve with balsamic vinaigrette on the side for drizzling.

Balsamic Vinaigrette

Add all dressing ingredients to a mason jar. Seal the lid tightly and shake well until emulsified. Store extra dressing in the refrigerator for 1 to 2 weeks.

Earth Day Birthday

April is one of my favorite months because it means it's time for my birthday! April 22 also happens to be Earth Day, so a few years ago one of my good friends declared it my "bearthday!"

I am a high school science teacher by trade so when I was in the classroom, I made sure to throw a bearthday party each year. Now that I teach online, I email out local options for students to celebrate on their own and send me picture evidence. There are often Earth Day festivals or beach clean-ups for students to attend but one of my favorite local and frequent ways to care for our Earth and our neighbors is by shopping at farmers markets!

We have a variety of options for farmer's markets here in Volusia County. I want to share some of my favorite features here and you can also see a list of markets at the end. Before you head out to the markets, though, I recommend having a variety of ways to pay, like cash, card and payment apps. You also need to have a great bag to hold all of your goodies. I have the cutest market tote from Gathered in Ormond Beach (775 S. Yonge Street). It has a sturdy bottom and sides to keep everything from my chicken eggs to fresh pastries safe!



While I've always enjoyed going to markets, it was really at the height of the pandemic in 2020 when many stores were closed, or safety precautions put in place that I started trying to buy a more significant portion of my groceries from local farmers. The markets are out in the fresh air, and you can really build a community by shopping from the same folks week after week. I could buy meat and eggs from one vendor, veggies from another, honey from a third and even sip some tasty tropical juices from VaPour Beverages (find their current location on Facebook or Instagram) as I shopped.

I just recently went back to the Port Orange market at the Pavilion (5501 S. Williamson Blvd.) after not having been for a while. It has nearly doubled in size! There's usually a saying that you shouldn't shop while you're hungry, but this market is set up to do just that! There are food trucks set up in almost a "food court" where you can pick up your mini donuts and coffee from Coastal Donuts (find their current location on Facebook or Instagram) or other delicious treats and then shop around for your produce, sausage, honey, goat's milk soap, hummus, jams, baked goods and more.

The Artisan Alley Farmers Market on Friday nights in Deland has a much different feel than the other morning markets due to its time and location. You can still pick up your produce and soaps, but now you can stroll around the market with beer from Persimmons Hollow Brewing Co. (111 W. Georgia Ave.) and check out the local shops and murals downtown. There are often more artistic vendors and musicians here, too.

Farmer's Markets are a great way to get outside and support small, local businesses in our community. Instead of products that travel from hundreds of miles away, they are grown, crafted, and picked from right here in our neighbors' yards! So, class, your assignment this Earth Day (and my bearthday), is to find the market nearest to you and support the Earth and your friends by going to it!

"Thank you," my uncle said gratefully.


In unison, we clinked our glasses, celebrating the reason to continue the party for the next two days.

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Fishaholic: April Report

Hello there, it's Captain Austin bringing you the April fishing report for the New Smyrna Beach area. The past few weeks have seen things really pick up on the fishing front. From the backwaters to the inlet and off the beach, the fish have become very active making for some amazing catches. I expect the fishing to only get better as we move closer to summer.

When the weather cooperates, we get the chance to venture offshore a few miles to fish the local reefs and wrecks. Most good bottom structure will hold red snapper and we've been fortunate to get in some action with these tasty critters. An added benefit to fishing structure is that at any time a cobia might pop up. Make sure you are ready with a live bait or brightly colored jig.




Redfish and snook catches are increasing every week and our clients have been catching some really large fish. Tides play a big part in catching both redfish and snook and if you are not in the right place at the right time, your chances for success are diminished. Both fish respond strongly to live bait so it's probably a good idea to make an effort to get some. Bait like mullet, pinfish, croakers or shrimp will be the ticket to some good sized fish.

Another reason to be excited for spring time is the shark fishing. From blacktips to spinners these guys will be common along the beach and they can be a lot of fun to catch. The great thing about shark fishing is that you don't necessarily need a boat to catch them. Surf fishing anglers have a good shot of catching one of these sharks if they have the proper tackle. A couple feet of wire leader tied to 60-pound or heavier mono leader should get the job done. Most of these sharks are 40 to 80 pounds with some over 100. Just make sure you use caution while landing them for obvious reasons.

fishing Report

Spring is here and the fish are hungry and active! Although the weather has been up and down the bite has remained steady for quite a long time! As of late, the water clarity is still very clear and the bait pods are everywhere in the backwaters. Cobia fishing this year has been hit or miss, with a few clear, sunny days and not much action. The amount of big rays, though, has been frequent!

As always, the redfish bite continues to be strong, whether using artificial or live bait the hook up will always be there. I've been seeing numerous groups of redfish crawling the banks and lurking amongst the oyster beds. Look for the redfish to be out during the lower tides.

With the warmer weather coming in, the snook are also starting to activate more freely and will be grouping up in areas that they can ambush their prey. Top water lures are my favorite for the snook, as the bite is fast and aggressive! The snook like to hide, so remember to throw everywhere!

Lady angler, Rachel Vause, had a fun trip recently catching a solid trout using live mullet. This day, the fishing was on fire with fish all over the zones. I have found that the bigger trout really like the live mullet, but will also bite artificial if it is presented properly.

Look for more action as the waters start to warm up and the fish remain hungry!

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






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
