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


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Roadtrippers: The Ultimate App for Planning Your Next Summer Adventure

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Did You Know Your Realtor Can Fire You? Here's How to Avoid It

People who make up the real estate market include home buyers, sellers and their Realtor®. In Florida, Realtors work as transaction brokers, unless the customer and broker agree to establish a single agent or no brokerage relationship in writing. As a transaction broker, the Realtor can guide both parties, sometimes simultaneously, through the transaction to get to the closing table.

Considering this is the largest purchase/sale many people make, it's fair and reasonable for consumers to want the ability to part ways if the job isn't getting done. But what many people do not think about is whether they can be fired by their agent.

A Realtor is required to treat everyone fairly and not discriminate. There are federal and state fair housing laws in place for this. Florida's fair housing law states, "Floridians are entitled by law to rent a place to live or buy a home without consideration of their race, color, national origin, sex, handicap, familial status or religion." However, it is not against the law for Realtors to be expected to serve a customer who is not holding up their end of the relationship. The relationship should work like a team. Each player assists the other to make a closing win.

Some recent news articles cover extreme scenarios where Realtors fired their clients for reasons as crazy as a buyer who summoned ghosts while looking at homes. Most Realtors are going to be as agreeable as possible and would have to be pushed pretty far to decide to let go of a customer.

Listed below are some of the more common reasons a Realtor might fire a customer. Plan to avoid these scenarios while buying or selling property.

Working with other Realtors at the same time. This scenario is more common while working with buyers. When selling a home, a listing contract must be signed. Legally a buyer can look at homes with more than one agent, but that doesn't mean they should. All Realtors protect their time and effort they're spending with buyers since there is no guarantee the right property will come along. There is no protection from a buyer buying through another agent. A wise Realtor will stop working with a buyer once he/she finds out the buyer is working with someone else.

Making unreasonable demands. It is fair for a customer to expect their Realtor to be available and responsive, but being at an arm's length at all hours of the day or night or demand going beyond the call of duty, like cleaning the house or running errands - then a Realtor might decide to let this customer go.

Being biased or racist. Realtors are required to make sure their customers are not breaking any fair housing laws. If a customer is insistent on violating any laws created to protect specific classes of people at a federal or state level, be prepared to hear "you're fired."

Hiding issues with the property. Disclose, disclose, disclose. If a Realtor finds out the seller is hiding material defects, he/she will have to fire this customer.

Constantly making low offers with no basis. Presenting and defending any offer a buyer makes is part of a Realtor's job. The Realtor may assist one or two times with a lowball, but a professional Realtor will have to stop submitting offers that can not be justified and backed by recent sales data.

Being disrespectful. Rude, demeaning or condescending behavior is a recipe for the worst customer ever. A Realtor will refuse to tolerate it and will encourage the customer to take their business elsewhere.

This is not a comprehensive list of reasons why a Realtor would want to fire a customer. Instead, take this article as a peace of mind that there are lines drawn in the sand. Bottom line - treat everyone with respect, in both your personal and professional life and you will have a great working relationship and in some cases, a friend for life.

Another Daytona Beach restaurant featured on a Food Network show is Sauté Kingz (200 MLK Blvd). 

SEA TURTLE NESTING SEASON BEGINS

Sea turtle nesting season begins May 1, and Volusia County officials are asking residents, visitors and businesses to help protect natural habitat by observing all nesting season laws and regulations. The beaches of Volusia County are home to several species of endangered or threatened sea turtles.

Each year, sea turtles nest on Florida beaches from May 1 through October 31. Endangered sea turtles emerge from the surf at night to lay their eggs in the dry sand. It is illegal to touch or disturb the turtles, their nests and dune habitats.

You can help nesting sea turtles and hatchlings

by letting the night "provide the light." Remember to follow beachside/beachfront county ordinances during nesting season, including:

- Keeping beach-facing drapes and blinds closed after dark
- Turn off balcony lights when not in use
- Move lamps and light fixtures away from windows
- Avoid using flash photography and flashlights while on the beach at night
- If you see a turtle at night, keep at least 50 feet away from it and remain calm and quiet
- Fireworks are prohibited on the beach at all times



If you're just visiting for the day, when driving at the beach, use the designated traffic lanes and parking areas. Beach driving access hours are from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. throughout the nesting season, tide permitting. Flatten sandcastles, fill in holes, and take your chairs, equipment and trash with you. This is an easy way to reduce obstacles faced by sea turtles.

BLUE-GREEN ALGAE ALERT ISSUED FOR SEVERAL WEST VOLUSIA LAKES

The Florida Department of Health in Volusia County has issued a Health Alert for the presence of harmful blue-green algal toxins in Pioneer and Louise Lakes in Deltona and Bonita Lake in DeBary. This is in response to a water sample taken on April 5. The public should exercise caution in and around these lakes.

Residents and visitors are advised to take the

following precautions:

- Do not drink, swim, wade, use personal watercraft, water ski or boat in waters where there is a visible bloom.
- Wash your skin and clothing with soap and water if you have contact with algae or discolored or smelly water.
- Keep pets away from the area. Waters where there are algae blooms are not safe for animals. Pets and livestock should have a different source of water when algae blooms are present.
- Do not cook or clean dishes with water contaminated by algae blooms. Boiling the water will not eliminate the toxins.
- Eating fillets from healthy fish caught in freshwater lakes experiencing blooms is safe. Rinse fish fillets with tap or bottled water, throw out the guts and cook fish well.
- Do not eat shellfish in waters with algae blooms.

Blue-green algae are a type of bacteria that is common in Florida's freshwater environments. A bloom occurs when rapid growth of algae leads to an accumulation of individual cells that discolor water and often produce floating mats that emit unpleasant odors.

Some environmental factors that contribute to bluegreen algae blooms are sunny days, warm water temperatures, still water conditions and excess nutrients. Blooms can appear year-round but are more frequent in summer and fall. Many types of blue-green algae can produce toxins.

Blue-green algae blooms can impact human health and ecosystems, including fish and other aquatic animals.





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

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Welcome to Rockville Arrives

Are you ready to rock?! America's largest rock festival, Welcome to Rockville, is just around the corner, taking place from May 18-21, 2023, at the Daytona International Speedway in Daytona Beach, Florida. This fourday event is an all-ages celebration of all things rock, featuring some of the biggest names in the music industry. But before you start packing your bags and making travel arrangements, there are a few things you need to know to make the most of your experience.

First and foremost, Welcome to Rockville is a rain or shine event. However, in the case of inclement weather, such as severe thunderstorms, lightning, excessive wind, hail, or flooding, the festival may be paused, evacuated, or canceled.

Registration of your wristband is mandatory for entry, and the registration code is listed on the back of the RFID saddle of your wristband. Go to their website to complete the registration. This wristband is your ticket to the festival, and re-entry is not permitted unless you are camping on-site and have a camping wristband. So, make sure to plan accordingly and bring everything you need with you.



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For parents attending with children, it's important to note that this is an all-ages event, and all attendees, regardless of age, are required to purchase a full-price ticket. The festival strongly encourages parents to bring hearing protection for their children, as the music can get pretty loud.



Once inside the festival, you won't be able to leave and come back in, so make sure to bring everything you need with you. However, if there is an emergency and you must leave, speak to a supervisor at the gate. And be sure to check out the full schedule with set times, which will be posted about two weeks before the show via socials and the mobile app.

If you're of legal drinking age, beer, wine, and mixed drinks will be sold at the festival, with a valid photo ID. Credit cards and cashless payments via RFID wristband will also be accepted at all food & beverage locations and the merchandise stand.

Finally, all price levels are available in limited quantities, so buy early to save the most money. Your festival admission, camping, and parking passes are sold separately, and there is no difference in access between the levels. And don't forget to download the festival's mobile app before you arrive, so you can stay up-to-date on any weather changes and other updates. With its incredible lineup of artists and exciting atmosphere, this is one festival you won't want to miss. So, grab your tickets, pack your bags, and get ready to rock!

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Bonnet Springs Park -Lakeland, FL

This past October, Lakeland and the surrounding central Florida community was gifted with the new addition of a sprawling park. While this park is free to enter and open to the public, it is unique in that it is a privately developed public park that depends solely on public support.

Located on 168 acres of what was once the heart of Lakeland's developing infrastructure, the abandoned rail yard has been converted into a truly magical space to explore. Transformed into an endless green space beckoning exploration, its winding pathways read like a love letter to the community itself. After years of planning, fundraising and construction, Bonnet Springs Park now proudly boasts that it is Florida's best free natural attraction.

Our family visited on a pretty busy Saturday, and while the park was deceptively calm and quiet, it was buzzing with activity without feeling crowded and stressful. Free and frequent open-air shuttles are available to transport throughout the grounds, however, we opted instead to traverse the park from front to back (and back to front again!) covering nearly 7 miles to ensure we wouldn't miss a single beat of all it has to offer.

Bonnet Springs Park's website offers maps and details on everything you can find here, but these are a few of our favorite highlights.

Playgrounds, Play Spaces and Surprises:

Everywhere you look in this park, there's something to explore, climb on and take the time to just be a kid. Skillfully crafted playgrounds pay homage to Florida's past and present, with things like a huge wooden train to conduct and explore or a massive mosaic owl that hides climbing spaces and play equipment inside (*pictured below*).





The endless pathways leading through the park climb and fall over rolling hills, however nearly every hill has the option to slide down! Scott and Avery took turns zooming down the landscape at every turn, taking our outdoor exploration to a whole new level. A treehouse looms overhead in the branches that offer plenty of space for a cool spot to sit and eat lunch, or have a popsicle, beer or wine from the on-site vendors. Plenty of kids and grown ups alike brought along their bikes, scooters, skateboards and more to hit the wide walkways.

Nature at its Finest:

My favorite thing about this park is that not only is it a stunningly natural environment in the center of a bustling city, but that exploration of this space is not only allowed, it's encouraged. A walk down to Barefoot Creek beckons you to kick off your shoes, splash around and take a load off. A field of enormous climbing trees calls to kids of all ages to climb the limbs and branches. Many spots are like something straight out of a fairy tale.

A canopy walk traverses the treetops and stands 15 feet off the ground to get a different view of the park. The nature center, greenhouse and butterfly house invite you in to learn more about the natural world.

Education and Entertainment Intertwined:

In addition to the incredible outdoor spaces, Bonnet Springs Park is also home to a Children's Museum nestled in the heart of the landscape. Here, Avery tried her hand at a number of kidsized careers, including running a chaotic food truck, working on a farm, broadcasting the news, caring for creatures in a vet clinic, and even following in her grandmother's footsteps by working at a miniature Publix. Other areas offer a hands-on opportunity to explore the science of the natural world including electricity, sound and physics.

Just outside the museum (and adjacent to another hill slide!) sits a rooftop bar offering beer, wine and cocktails overlooking the park's outdoor event space. We cozied up for an afternoon drink while Avery downed some snacks and the park set up for an outdoor concert to be held that evening. A coffee shop and restaurant sit nearby to provide everything you need for the day.

Be sure to pack plenty of sunscreen for your adventure - we spent nine straight hours outside during our visit! Plan for a full day to explore and you won't regret it. I'm already planning my next trip back - see you there!

Blueberry Coconut Banana Bread



Satisfy your sweet cravings with this moist, tender Blueberry Coconut Banana Bread recipe! Packed with overripe bananas, juicy blueberries and coconut, this bread is the perfect combination of flavors and textures.

Preparation: Prep Time: 20 minutes • Cook Time: 1 hour • Servings: 12



Ingredients:

- 1/2 cup coconut oil or vegetable or canola oil
- 1 cup brown sugar packed
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 2 1/2 cups all purpose flour
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt
- 3 medium overripe bananas mashed (about 1 1/2 cups)
- 1 cup light coconut milk
- 1/2 pint fresh blueberries
- 1 cup sweetened flaked coconut



INSTRUCTIONS

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Lightly grease a 9 by 5-inch loaf pan, or whatever pans you prefer to use, and set aside. Place the coconut oil and brown sugar in a large bowl and whisk well. Add the eggs, one at a time, beating after each addition. Stir in the vanilla extract.

In a separate bowl, stir together the mashed banana and coconut milk. In a third bowl, whisk together the flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Into the egg mixture, gradually stir in the dry ingredients alternately with the wet ingredients, beginning and ending with the dry mixture. Mix until just combined. Fold in the flaked coconut and blueberries. Be sure not to overmix!

Pour the batter into the prepared baking pan. Bake for 1 hour to 1 hour and 15 minutes, or until a skewer or knife inserted in the center of the loaf comes out clean. Let bread cool in the pan for 5-10 minutes, then move it to a cooling rack and enjoy!

Preparation: Prep Time: 5 minutes • Servings: 1 cocktail

Ingredients:

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

Gotta get back to my coconut concoctions...



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Fishaholic: May Report

Hey, it's Captain Austin once again bringing you the fishing report for the Edgewater, New Smyrna Beach and Ponce Inlet areas. This past month, the fishing has steadily gotten better. One of the big reasons is the bait. We are seeing large schools of mullet, especially in the backwaters. The mullet are bait-sized (4 to 8 inches) and on certain tides they become very active.

With all the mullet around the trout, jacks, redfish and snook are never far behind. In addition to the mullet, the shrimp are showing up in good numbers. This is especially apparent when you fish around lighted docks. When fishing the docks, expect to see mangrove snapper, trout and snook all smashing the bait!



Finally the cobia showed up for a few days this past month with many anglers aettina in on the action. As I mentioned last month. cobia fishing can be more like hunting than fishing at times. You spend most of the day

scanning the water looking for manta rays, turtles or anything else floating around. If you are lucky, you may have as many as a dozen cobia trailing behind a manta ray and that's when the real fun starts! You want to cast your bait or lure to a spot in front of the ray where you don't snag or spook it.

Our two old standbys, redfish and snook, become more consistent and easier to catch in May. Hopefully we will see some of the biggest snook of the year being caught in the next few months. As usual, the key to catching both is the tides. Moving water flushes bait out and the redfish and snook wait to ambush the bait in many places along the intracoastal and in Ponce Inlet.

One type of fishing we have developed over the years is fishing for goliath grouper. Goliath groupers are the largest grouper on the planet with the largest one caught here in Florida weighing in at 680 pounds! Fishing for these amazing grouper peaks here in the spring and summer and we have been fortunate to catch some real nice ones the last couple of weeks.

Warning: You better eat your Wheaties before you decide to tangle with one of these bad boys! If you've never caught a big grouper we'd love to take you out. Call or text us at (386) 689-9056.

fishing Report

As Summer is starting to creep in, the bite continues to be hot both in the river and ocean. We have had our fair share of winds, which has not stopped the action at all. The cobia run has been stellar and the backwaters continue to provide tight lines. Looking ahead as the waters warm up, be ready for the snook and reds on top water and trout as well.

During the cobia run I was fishing with my good friend and neighbor Rob Vella out in front of our houses in Bethune just offshore. We spotted Nils Schweizer on his paddle board and here in his own words is what happened.

Still baffled that this actually happened! I'm a novice to fly fishing, @noahschweizer got me into it about a year ago and after a very frustrating beginning, I'm now hooked! I love the challenge and anything you catch is just that much more rewarding on fly.

So, Noah tied me up a fly for cobia, and I went out to try my luck. After about 2 hours out there and a few close calls with rays, I spotted a free swimming cobia, got the fly in front of him and it was on! After about a 15 minute battle I got it close to the board and thought it was ready to gaff...it was not!

I got him on the board and he went nuts! I tried holding him down but he was too powerful, broke my rod, threw the gaff, knocked my paddle off the board and got back into the water! But he was still hooked!

With my rod broken and paddle and gaff in opposite directions I wasn't sure what to do. I tried hand lining him in, but without the gaff it was impossible to grab him. So I got back to my paddle, and saw the gaff floating in the distance. As I was attempting to paddle to the gaff, while still fighting the fish, I saw a boat flying towards me. I waved my paddle to let them know I needed help and it happened to be my good friend @therealtupat with his buddy Rob! I couldn't believe my eyes, perfect timing!

I got into their boat and slowly hand lined him up. After a few attempts with the net we got him in the boat and I was elated to say the least. Thank you @therealtupat and Rob for showing up when you did and @noahschweizer for the magic fly! And thank you guys for taking the time to read my story. I must say this was one of the coolest fishing moments in my life and sharing it with my buddies was the icing on the cake. Great catch Nils and one for the memory bank for the years to come!

After dropping Nils off we decided to fish on. I had broken off on two larger sized cobia and was eager to get one in the boat. We pulled up on a large ray and I sight casted to a nice cobia using my brother Hopper's Mexican flare hawk jig. The cobia took it and I ended up fighting this fish for over 30 minutes before finally landing it. What an epic day!

In the later part of April my lady angler Rachel Vause and I took a trip to Stuart Florida to hunt the snook! She ended up catching one of the biggest jacks I've personally ever seen. She ended up fighting that fish for a good 30 minutes and after it was all said and done they both wore each other out! Rachel was using light tackle and gave it her all to land that beast of jack! You did a great job Honey, epic fight and catch!

As we move into Summer, be ready for more action. I recommend using live bait, top water lures and any type of paddle tails. The bite will be hot but you must be patient and find your spots!
