USDA Awards \$25 Million for Lake to Lagoon Program

The Lake to Lagoon regional conservation partnership program, which includes Volusia County as a key member, has been awarded \$25 million from the U.S. Department of Agriculture to conserve sensitive agricultural lands and implement conservation and land management activities that will bolster climate resiliency. The Lake to Lagoon area includes the low-lying counties of Volusia, Lake and Flagler, which are home to more than a million residents and a diversity of wildlife, wildlands, rural farms and timberlands.

The Alachua Conservation Trust leads the Lake to Lagoon program in collaboration with Volusia County and Stetson University's Institute for Water and Environmental Resilience. Volusia County is the largest contributor to the program, having provided \$20 million in matching funds through the voterapproved Volusia Forever program.

Other member organizations are the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, St. Johns River Water Management District, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, East Central Florida Regional Planning Council, North Florida Prescribed Burn Association, Friends of Wekiva, West Volusia Audubon, and the Riverside Conservancy.



"Through this innovative public-private partnership, Volusia County will be able to provide farmers, ranchers, and foresters with an alternative to selling their land for development and allow them to maintain it for agricultural production in perpetuity," said Land Acquisition Manager Tim Telfer.

Volusia County Pauses Development in Heavy Industrial Zoned Areas and Directs Enactment of a Nine-Month Moratorium

The Volusia County Council unanimously directed staff to review the Heavy Industrial (I-2) Zoning Districts and enact a nine-month moratorium on development. The pending ordinance doctrine stops the processing of site plan applications in unincorporated I-2 zoned areas, preventing the submission of a development application for properties zoned as I-2. County staff is to review and potentially recommend revisions to these regulations to modernize the zoning category and reflect the current state of local communities.

I have written a lot of Christmas stories over the years. Holiday memories are the best, but there is one topic I can't believe I never wrote about, and it's been staring me in the face for years.



If you want the beauty and the realism of a Christmas tree, but don't want to worry about watering it, dealing with sap, and cleaning up dried needles, investing in a high-quality artificial Christmas tree could be a good option for you.

Choosing a live Christmas tree? Did you know Christmas trees from the north are cut



from mid-November to mid-December? To ensure your live Christmas tree stays vibrant and fresh throughout the holiday season, consider trimming the trunk straight across. This simple step allows the sap to seal the base, keeping moisture in. Something else to take into consideration is a tree that touches the floor. They are beautiful, but when you start putting gifts under the tree... you can't. Your gifts end up in the middle of the living room or if you have a train, it needs to be huge.

The best live Christmas trees to check out this year are Fraser Fir, Noble Fir, Colorado Blue Spruce, Grand Fir and Balsam Fir.

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Volusia County Schools Rezoning Rundown

My household has always felt a call to students: I teach high school science online, my husband and two housemates are on staff with a college campus ministry, InterVarsity Christian Fellowship, and my kids attend local schools. When we decided to move here just over 5 years ago, we specifically felt called to the students (VPK - college) and the rich history of the Midtown neighborhood of Daytona Beach.

Before we even moved in to our home, we saw the zoning maps for Midtown, sending elementary students out to 12 different schools and middle school students to five schools around the area. We bought a house mere blocks from Bethune-Cookman University, and yet were zoned for Pine Trail Elementary in north Ormond Beach and then Silver Sands Middle down in Port Orange. We quickly learned that most of these zoning choices were made in the '60s as schools were being integrated. Students from the historically Black neighborhood were bused out to various schools in an attempt to make all things equal.

The Supreme Court case, Brown vs. Board of Education, deemed that "separate but equal" schools for children of different racial backgrounds are inherently not equal. Unfortunately, while bussing students to different schools may try to equalize student numbers, it does not give students an equitable learning experience. Some students must spend hours per week on a bus to attend a school that is too far for even their parents to be involved. And the students that get to stay at the last neighborhood school, Turie T. Small (after Bonner Elementary was closed) are left with a school building that has fallen into disrepair and a harder time recruiting high quality educators.

Knowing all of this, my family still made the decision to move into Midtown, send our children to Turie T. Small Elementary,



and get to work meeting with stakeholders within the district to change zoning. I remember meeting with then school board representative, Ida Wright, about looking into converting local schools to Magnet schools, as I had seen down in Brevard County, to increase funding and attract families to the neighborhood. I didn't even think of the idea of building a brandnew school and have been so delighted as those plans have moved forward and the new Turie T. Small Elementary is currently being built!

I am proud to have joined my voice with the many in the Midtown neighborhood asking for changes from the district over the years. Because of the community, just this year, a large number of students in the area were rezoned to stay closer to home at either Westside Elementary or Beachside Elementary. When the new Turie T. is completed next year, the rest of the 32114 students will come back "home" rather than continuing to be bused to schools in Port Orange. This has been one of the topics of the ongoing district sponsored rezoning meetings. For middle schools rezoning, students in Midtown (like my girls) will now get to stay at Campbell Middle School instead of riding a bus right past it into Port Orange. While I have heard most residents excited for our new elementary school, there have been concerns that the middle school plan will cause overcrowding or re-segregate the school. I attended one of the rezoning meetings where the district discussed that the current demographics are 57 percent Black students and 24 percent White students. If every student that lives in the new zoning area for Campbell Middle actually went there, then the demographics would change to 58 percent Black and 23 percent White.

As for overcrowding, if every student moved (which some likely won't due to home school, virtual school or private school), then the school would be at 103 percent capacity. While that sounds high, the state does not consider a school to be overcrowded until they hit 115 percent capacity.

There has been a long history of zoning in the Midtown neighborhood of Daytona Beach harming rather than helping students. I have attended town halls where community leaders such as Daytona Beach Commissioner, Paula Reed, and Daytona Beach Leisure Services Director, Keith Willis, shared their experiences of being sent to integrate schools rather than attending the one in their neighborhood. I, and I hope others, are happy that positive changes are being made to both the zoning and the physical buildings within this historic 32114 area.

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






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Bobby G Takes on Local Oyster Farming

December has arrived, signaling the conclusion of another year filled with countless adventures. This column has been my gateway to "taking on" diverse people and places, enriching my understanding in ways I might never have imagined. This month was certainly no exception, as I delved into the intricacies of the local oyster farming industry. The experience took me out to an oyster farm, immersing me in the waters with Sharkbite Oysters, and providing an opportunity to engage in conversation with the Indian River Oyster Company.

In 2017, marine biologist Dennis David, previously associated with the Florida Wildlife Commission, embarked on a pioneering venture with his family, establishing the Indian River Oyster Company (IROC). This initiative marked the first water column lease on the east coast of Florida, situated in the waters near Canaveral National Seashore.

Subject to approval from state and federal regulations, including the governor, the process of securing the lease took approximately 10 months. The chosen locations were specifically selected

to align with their farming method, utilizing the bag system. In this approach, steel racks are embedded in the sand, and plastic mesh bags are laid across the tops of these racks, surrounded by water when the tide comes in. The preference for shallow areas facilitates ease of farming, providing a more accessible environment, while also offering enhanced protection during significant storms and hurricanes.

Currently, there are two zones covering 7.5 acres from the surface to the bottom on either side of the shipyard channel, located near Mary McLeod Park in Bethune Beach. These areas are diligently monitored for water quality, enabling us to enjoy oysters year-round in our region.

Collaborating with Ryan Norris, the primary force behind the farming efforts, they have established an opportunity for individuals to participate in educational sessions about the oyster farming process. This initiative not only promotes learning but also encourages support for other local oyster farmers in the area. When asked why would you train your competition he simply stated, "they are not competition, they are a community of people creating a better environment for our estuaries."



It was now my turn to explore the oyster farms firsthand, so I picked up the phone and called Sam Walsh, the owner and operator of Sharkbite Oysters. This family business, initiated last year, is a collaborative effort involving Sam, his mom Giselle, dad Jim, and his partner Hannah. The excitement began for me the moment I laid eyes on their Instagram account. The Wes Anderson-style skit featuring Sam on the boat, complete with a zinc oxide-coated nose, was both impressive and amusing. Then I headed over to the website which shares a compelling story of their beginnings and offered a preview of the delightful experience awaiting me.

We boarded the boat crafted by Sam himself, aptly named Booby - although not for the reason most minds might assume. I know, we entertained that thought too, but it's actually named after the blue-footed booby, a bird. Navigating through the sandbars, a task that certainly required a knowledgeable captain, we steadily approached the oyster farm. It was my first encounter with an oyster farm, and truthfully, it wasn't quite what I had envisioned. I suppose I had anticipated seeing oysters everywhere. Sam quickly jumped out of the boat and began demonstrating the intricacies of the oyster farming process. Initially hesitant due to the chilly weather that day, I was quickly persuaded to jump in by Tiffany. Once in the water, Sam opened a bag secured with a bungee cord, revealing a collection of beautiful medium-sized deep-shelled oysters. He went on to elaborate that at Sharkbite Oysters, the objective is to ensure each oyster possesses an identical appearance, characterized by a briny yet sweet minerality and flavor influenced by the merroir - the minerals in the water, similar to terroir in wine, impacting its unique characteristics.

I actually hadn't tried any of his oysters before, so he shucked a few and handed me some to taste right there in the middle of the Intracoastal. The flavor was a wonderful mix of salty and sweet - it was my first time enjoying one fresh out of the water. There was no need for lemon or horseradish, it was perfectly balanced. We enjoyed a couple and got back to the questions.



Talking with Sam, his passion is as clear, as is his concern for the environment. His eyes lit up when he spoke about the benefits of oysters, emphasizing how they filter up to 50 gallons of water per adult oyster each day as well as create a habitat for sea life, provide estuary reefs, and offer the potential for more jobs in our water-centric area. "Oysters only provide, they take nothing from the environment." Sam explained.

Want to try them yourself? For both retail and commercial customers, they offer 50 count or 100 count bags. If the order is placed by Wednesday afternoon, the oysters can be ready for pickup or delivery as soon as Thursday afternoon. If you're a local in New Smyrna Beach, they can arrange for convenient local delivery or pickup. For those a bit farther away, no worries! They offer overnight shipping within the U.S. Just drop them a message, specifying the quantity you need and the destination, and they'll get back to you ASAP!

But that's not all. They can cater your event! They offer catering services for local Volusia County events and are even willing to travel for an additional fee. They bring everything you'll need to enjoy their oysters without having to do any of the work. Drop them a line to reserve your day and get a quote!

Sam and his family offer unique jewelry handcrafted by his mom, Giselle, using oyster shells and he has his own custom-branded apparel line available on his website. Definitely keep this in mind if you need a unique gifts!

As we said goodbye to Sam and his Booby, I couldn't help but appreciate the incredible impact of individuals like him, his family, and the team at IROC. They haven't just forged a business opportunity; they've paved the way for the future, fostering an environment where nature can thrive and replenish itself without causing harm to our ecosystem. Thank you so much for the chance to explore an unknown subject and another amazing adventure.

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
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
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
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Inside Look: Boho Collective Company

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


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Glowing Wonders

Nothing marks the holiday season quite like the sparkle of twinkling lights. The Central Florida Zoo in Sanford takes this to a whole new level with a dazzling immersive display that combines Asian culture with the shimmer of the season.

The Asian Lantern Festival: Into the Wild, now in its fifth year, transforms the night with thousands of lights and traditional Asian lanterns along a threefourths mile walking path throughout the zoo.



As visitors stroll through the enchanting pathways, they are treated to breathtaking scenes of illuminated wildlife, mythical creatures and botanical wonders. The festival not only captivates with its visual spectacle but also offers a unique opportunity to learn about Asian traditions, art and folklore. Against the backdrop of the popular Central Florida Zoo, visitors

can immerse themselves in the beauty of this cultural extravaganza while enjoying live performances and engaging activities for all ages.

While the event takes place after most of the zoo animals' bedtimes, you won't be missing out as many of the lanterns take shape as massive creatures, including fluttering butterflies, towering flamingos, and even a prehistoric land teeming with long-lost beasts. An enormous, 50-foot-long phoenix takes center stage as her tail ripples down the path. These aren't just light displays, they are dazzling works of art, handcrafted with colorful specialty fabric and intricate details. I was surprised to find that a great deal of the lanterns actually move, with birds craning their heads to peep at you or fairies dancing as they welcome you in.

Our family attended the festival for the first time, with our best friends, the Willis Family, who have been attending since its inception. The two 5-yearolds of the bunch, Avery and Camden (pictured below), had a blast together with the interactive exhibits, especially a dinosaur that mimics your movements as you dance in front of sensors, and a huge glowing piano that plays as you run along its keys. Tasty treats and snacks like warm soft pretzels, cocktails, hot chocolate and more are available at stops throughout the trail.



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We made our way through a series of beautiful birds and a towering wall of flowers that unfurled and closed their petals as insects flitted around them. Our next stop was through a prehistoric walk, full of dangerous creatures throughout the likes of the Cretaceous, Jurassic and Pleistocene eras. A T-rex rules this land, as he oversees from a rock formation, blowing hot smoke from his mouth as he roars. The kids giggled as they were "eaten" by a massive dino skull, left dangling in its teeth.

You can follow a path along the Chinese zodiac, and find your assigned animal based on the year you were born. Each animal shows the reputed attributes the person is "likely" to have. We all took turns reading each other's and mulling over the truths and... questionable personality traits. The most fitting being Scott is the year of the monkey – a fun personality that's clever and curious, but mostly mischievous.

Boneless Pork Chops with Caramelized Apples TASTE

Preparation: Prep Time: 10 minutes • Cook Time: 15 minutes • Rest Time: 10 minutes • Servings: 4

One pan, 30 minutes, and very little babysitting are all you need for these Boneless Pork Chops with Caramelized Apples! This comforting meal is very fall-forward, and you're going to love the flavors that come from the simple pantry ingredients that go into it!

Ingredients:

- •4 boneless pork chops 1/2inch thick
- 2 teaspoons fresh sage minced
- 1 teaspoons fresh rosemary minced
- 1 teaspoon Kosher salt plus more to taste
- 1 teaspoon Black pepper plus more to taste
- 1 tablespoon olive oil divided
- 1 medium red onion thinly sliced
- 2 red apples thinly sliced
- 1/3 cup red wine
- 2/3 cup beef or chicken broth
- 1 tablespoon maple syrup
- 1 teaspoon apple cider vinegar



INSTRUCTIONS

Rub the minced herbs on both sides of the pork chops, then season with salt and pepper to taste. Heat a large cast-iron skillet over high heat, then add half of the olive oil. Sear the pork chops for 2 minutes on each side, until golden. Transfer to a plate.

Remove the skillet from the heat and carefully wipe it out with paper towels. Return the skillet to the stove, reduce heat to medium, then add the remaining olive oil. Add the onion and apples and cook for 5-6 minutes until lightly browned, stirring frequently. Season with salt and pepper, then stir in the wine, deglazing the pan with a wooden spoon to release the brown bits from the bottom. Allow to reduce for 1 minute, then stir in the broth and maple syrup.

Return the pork chops to the skillet, nestling them between the apples and onions. Cover and cook for 4-5 minutes, turning once, until just cooked through. Center pork temperature should be at least 145 degrees F when probed with a meat thermometer. Serve the pork chops, onion and apples over mashed potatoes or rice, drizzled with the pan juices.

Brown Butter Fig & Pear Baked Brie Preparation: Prep Time: 10 minutes • Cook Time: 25 minutes • Servings: 4

This creamy Brown Butter Fig & Pear Baked Brie is both elegant and comforting, and is sure to be the hit of any holiday or cold weather party! Figs, pears, pecans and a little sweetness bring out the best in your favorite soft cheese.

Ingredients:

- 1 wheel brie cheese
- ¹/₄ cup unsalted butter
- 3 large fresh figs quartered
- 1 pear chopped
- ¹/₄ cup brown sugar packed
- ¹/₂ teaspoon vanilla extract
- ¹/₂ cup pecans
- Baguette slices and/or crackers for serving



INSTRUCTIONS

Preheat the oven to 325 degrees F. Place unwrapped brie round in a 5-inch cast iron skillet or brie baker. Place on a baking sheet and set aside. Set a heavy-bottomed pan over medium-low heat. Add the butter and allow it to melt. Gently swirl the butter as it goes through two stages - popping & crackling as the water boils out, and the browning of the butter solids.

As the solids begin to brown, use a spoon to peek through the foam for the light brown flecks inside - it will start to smell nutty and delicious. The whole process from solid stick to brown butter will take about 10 minutes.

Quickly add figs, chopped pear and brown sugar. Stir until sugar is melted and well combined. Simmer for 2-3 minutes, then add vanilla and pecans. Stir until well coated, then remove from heat. Pour mixture over the brie. Bake for 10-15 minutes until the brie is warm and softened. Serve with baguette slices and/or crackers.

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Fishaholic: December Report

It's Captain Austin again, bringing you the fishing report for the New Smyrna Beach area. This year is extra special as my wife and I just recently welcomed a baby boy into the world! We are all very excited - especially big sister, Riley. This Christmas is going to be special.

It would be an understatement to say the fishing has been good lately as the snook fishing has been outstanding the last few weeks. It's a stark contrast to last year this time when we had record rain to deal with.

What many don't realize is that November and December can be the best time of the year to catch big snook. The key word is "can" as certain conditions have to be met for the fishing to be great. First, no tropical systems interfering. Second, bait like mullet, shrimp and croakers must be plentiful. Third, no major cold fronts where the air temperature dips below freezing for more than a day. If everything lines up, the snook fishing can be spectacular.

In the back waters, fishing will be completely dependent on the cold fronts that pass through our area. Prior to the fronts the fishing can be great for redfish, trout, flounder and snook. Once the front moves through, the fishing usually slows down until things warm up.

One notable exception are bluefish who are used to the cold as they come down all the way from places like New York and Massachusetts, just like the snowbirds that visit our area every winter clogging up our roads -HA! (Just kidding, we love our wintertime residents!) Bluefish can be a "day saver" when nothing else is biting as they will eat just about anything. Found everywhere from the beach to the backwaters, bluefish are fun to catch, especially for kids.

Big redfish are still around and once you find them it's not very hard to get them to eat. We prefer live bait, but lures like jigs and paddle tails work just as well at times. Unlike snook, they are less susceptible to cold fronts and are much heartier. Our average-sized redfish is over 30 inches and many fish weigh 10 to 20 pounds, which is very big when compared to many places in Florida.

Hope to see you out on the water and as always, we'd love to take you fishing!



fishing report

November brought heavy rainfall, resulting in elevated tides throughout the month. Surprisingly, the inclement weather did not stop the fish from displaying aggressive feeding behavior. Personally, I've been having great success with Henn lures in recent weeks, particularly the Lil' Shrimp in white. As the water begins to clear, the fish are becoming more visible, making sight casting an increasingly effective technique.

During a recent outing with my fishing buddy, Dave McKinnon, I experienced an exceptional day of sight casting, targeting multiple redfish using the Henn Lil' Shrimp paired with a 1/4-ounce jig head. The lifelike movement of this little shrimp in the water proved irresistibly enticing, leading to consistent bites.

I highly recommend these baits for anglers seeking reliable success. With the redfish forming schools, it seems we're in for an outstanding winter season. Keep an eye out for larger snook basking in the sun, but exercise utmost stealth as these species are easily spooked.


